
These items involved, specific posters, artefacts, manuscripts and models of the Ka'aba, Masjid an Nabawi and the inside of the Ka'aba.

The 35,000 sq ft Durban Exhibition Centre is situated near the beaches of Durban. It hosted Exhibition Islam from Friday 25th December 2009 to Sunday 3rd January 2010 the first time that Exhibition Islam visited, and this time, it hosted Exhibition Islam again for the duration of the Souk from Thursday 22nd December 2011 to Monday 2nd January 2012.



DISPLAY ITEMS

The exhibition was composed of posters covering the basics of Islam, the life of the prophet Muhammed (peace be upon him), the amazing Qur'an, and Islam's relationship with other faiths.



The Artefacts included original manuscripts, coins from the early Abbasid Caliphs, a replica of an Ottoman soldiers helmet, the first ever Qur'an translated into English and an antique miniature Qur'an.


